Forest Service. Heather had a car out there, so they drove it back at the same time in order not to carry gear or food on the bikes. They followed a route created by the Adventure Cycling Association called the Western Express and the Trans America. It follows regular roads but tries to stay in rural areas with less traffic. (The map makers rarely took into account hills, or whether you were actually going east-west). The route also intersected with many National Parks, National Monuments and Scenic Byways. The Mackeys bicycled for about two months and rode almost 3,600 miles! They traversed nine states and climbed six major mountain passes. They had snow or hail almost every time they climbed a major pass, but other than a couple of wasted half days, they were always able to continue. All kinds of wildlife were seen and the scenery was breath-taking.

Springs. Their cross-country trip took them to the Grand Canyon, Arizona (both South and North Rim); Monument Valley, Utah; Durango, Colorado; Great Sand Dune National Park, Colorado; and Tall Grass Prairie National Preserve, Kansas.

Come join Schneider as he takes you on two scenic rides of more than 50 miles along the South and North Rim of the Grand Canyon, hikes into the Canyon from the North Rim, and takes a day hike on the more

than 800-mile long Arizona Trail. On a half-day tour he visits Monument Valley. It has some of the most recognizable features in the country, and includes scenes from many movies, beginning with "Stagecoach," the 1939 John Wayne western.

Come ride the Durango-Silverton Narrow Gauge Railroad as it snakes and climbs its way along the Animus River for 45 miles

> between Durango and the former mining town of Silverton, Colorado. Join along on a visit to Great Sand Dunes National Park, a park in a setting that does not seem real.

On all of his previous western trips, Schneider simply drove through the plains without taking in their unique charm. Join him as he actually stops and observes what the prairie looked like before it became the breadbasket of the country. The Tallgrass Prairie National Preserve is a place

that has grasses reaching up to seven feet tall and root systems up to eight feet deep.

Although this trip was a lot shorter than his previous trips out west, the places he visited on this one should again whet your appetite to visit the great scenic beauties of our country.

# Spring mud season alert: Stay below 3,000 feet

During spring mud season, trails are particularly vulnerable to erosion. The spring thaw creates mud that penetrates much deeper into the soil than the surface mud created by summer rains, and trails are thus more easily damaged by hikers' boots. Alpine vegetation, which is fragile and endangered to begin with, is also particularly vulnerable at this time. It is therefore best to stay off higher elevation trails during early spring.

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation institutes a voluntary trail closure in the Eastern High Peaks during this time of year that asks hikers to refrain from traveling above 3,000 feet. This is done to protect alpine vegetation and prevent trail erosion.

More information on trail conditions in the Adirondacks can be found on the DEC Web site or by contacting the DEC Forest Rangers at 518-897-1200.

Closure typically runs from May through early to mid-June. If you are planning a trip to the High Peaks during this period, please call the ADK High Peaks Information Center at 518-523-3441 or DEC Region 5 headquarters to learn about trail conditions and whether the voluntary closure is in effect.

# Chapter finances in 2010

Last year, the Glens Falls-Saratoga Chapter's total income was \$22,647, a decrease of \$5,335 (19.1%) from \$27,982 income in 2009. Even though our chapter membership has been relatively stable, the prepayment of dues to the Chapter from the recently adopted multiple-year ADK membership caused a significant revenue spike in 2009. We spent \$26,102, a decrease of \$944 (3.5%) from \$27,046 in 2009. We ended the year with a deficit of \$3,455 and total assets of \$6,057.

Revenues included \$19,706 in dues money (the Main Club provides the Chapter 30 percent of all basic ADK membership dues paid by Chapter members), \$2,442 for the Chapter Banquet, \$18 in interest, and \$481 in other revenues.

The greatest Chapter expenditure was \$12,679 (49%) for Chepontuc Footnotes, our bimonthly newsletter. Other large expenses included \$5,038 (19%) in donations to support the activities of the Main Club, including a \$1,000 donation to support the October 2 ADK Backcountry Stewardship Rendezvous which brought together trail stewards and lean-to adopters for a day of workshops and other activities. The Chapter spent \$3,181 (12%) on our Chapter Banquet and \$2,125 (8%) to support area youngsters going to DEC Camps and ADK Youth Trail Work Programs. We contributed \$1,050 (4%) to other like-minded outdoor organizations, spent \$422 (2%) to present our Chapter Programs, and \$400 (2%) to run our Outing Program and honoring our trip leaders. Additional expenses of \$1,207 (5%) supported activities of our remaining Chapter Committees such as Conservation, Education, Fire Tower Challenge, Hospitality, Membership, Publicity, Trails, Website, Wilderness, Younger Members, and the administrative functions of the Chapter.

# Executive Committee meeting minutes synopsis

Minutes from January 5, 2011

Treasurer John Schneider presented the December (and year-end) Treasurer's Report. The Club is current on its dues payments to the Chapter (through 11/2010). Other income for the year was \$481; the sources included snowshoe and bear canister rentals, and Firetower Challenge patch sales. Due to a declining bank balance, in December John paid the Club only \$4,000 of the budgeted \$5,000 donation; there was no objection to this. The 2010 deficit was over \$3,400 and the Chapter will start the year with \$6,057.20.

John then discussed the **2011 budget**. The Club's changes in the manner of payment of multi-year dues continue to affect dues income, and it will be hard to predict the exact effect of that. The various categories of expenditures were discussed and the budget for Club donations has been further reduced to \$3,000. There was a discussion of saving money by finding a volunteer to do the newsletter layout. It was decided to combine special donations and Chapter memberships in other organizations into a single budget line. It was decided to keep giving a \$5 rebate to people who join at special events, as an incentive to join. It was decided to remove \$300 for the purchase of ADK calendars for the Executive Committee members from the administration budget. It was decided to increase the entertainment budget for the annual dinner to \$700, partially restoring a proposed cut.

Maureen Coutant gave the first Chapter Chair's Report of her new reign as Chair

**Jacki Bave, Conservation Chair**, DEC purchased conservation easements on 89,000 acres of former Finch Pruyn lands, with recreational access to some parcels.

Barb Bave, Firetower Challenge Coordinator, It was agreed that the charge for a rocker patch for the Winter Firetower Challenge completers will be \$2.00.

Mo reported on Membership for Pat Desbiens, The Chapter lost a net of 6 members in November. Mo also reported on Programs for Marisa Christiano, who was absent. The March program will be on the 24<sup>th</sup>. Mo said that she was contacted by *The Post-Star* for a story about the effects of the lack of snow on winter activities, such as Chapter outings. The story ran today.

John Caffry said that Warren County is proposing two projects in the **Big Cedar Swamp** wetlands. After consulting with Mo and Jacki, and Audubon, he will oppose these actions on behalf of the Big Cedar Swamp Coalition.

For safety, the MINIMUM number for Outings is: 3 people, including the leader (4 in winter) Panera Bread unless otherwise noted in the trip description. Be there and ready to depart at the posted time (directions below).

#### TRAVEL INFORMATION/CAR POOLS

We encourage carpooling to trailheads for both environmental and practical reasons (limited trailhead parking) and may alter meeting locations due to destination or participants. If you are able, it's helpful to the 'regulars' to offer to drive your vehicle. If you are a passenger, consider current fuel prices, travel miles and number of passengers when contributing your fair share to the driver.

#### **PARTICIPATION GUIDELINES**

Leaders are responsible to evaluate interested parties' fitness for that outing, review specific guidelines, and lead the trip. They are not paid guides, but volunteers. Participants are asked to cooperate and respect their authority and decisions.

\*Is this the right Outing for you? For those not experienced in strenuous trips, it is best to begin with something easier and work your way up. The Leader will assist in evaluating skill level and suggest alternative outings if more appropriate. For the safety and comfort of all, the Leader has the discretion to deny participation if he/she feels someone is not a good match for that trip. Based on the expectations and skills of the entire group, Leaders may have more flexibility for some trips, so definitely talk with them. DO NOT TRY STRENUOUS OUTINGS UNLESS YOU HAVE DONE THAT ACTIVITY REGULARLY (AND RECENTLY) AND ARE IN GOOD SHAPE AS NECESSARY FOR THAT OUTING.

\*ADK Liability Waiver must be provided by Leader and signed by all participants before the trip begins. This is a requirement by ADK HQ. Parents must sign for minors.

\*No Pets allowed on outings except where designated in the description.

#### HIKING NEEDS/PREPARATION/EQUIPMENT

Bring Trail Food and plenty of Water on ALL hikes! \*Clothing made of Polyester blends, polarguard or wool are recommended as they retain warmth even when wet. — NOT 100% Cotton clothing! It is also wise to bring raingear. Other pack essentials: compass and map, headlamp/flashlight, first aid kit, hat, gloves, and extra socks. Adirondack weather can and does change suddenly. Don't trust the forecast or the sky based on the start of the day. Be prepared!

#### SPECIAL WINTER NEEDS

In addition to the preparation/equipment mentioned above, winter requires some EXTRA planning. Look for special notes in the Outing description and discuss with the Leader. Depending on conditions, participants will can expect to bring Snow Shoes and Crampons. Bring lots of Water. Dehydration comes easier in the winter and we feel its effects later ... usually AFTER the fact. Be wise with Emergency Clothing. Bring an extra wool/polypro hat, mittens and socks. Vented "Shell" pants, jackets and mittens are commonly used with warm layers beneath.
