

2025 marks the 100th year since Johns Brook Lodge (JBL) was opened to the public. Since 1925, JBL has offered hikers a unique backcountry lodging experience in the heart of the Adirondacks.

Accessible only by foot and set 3.5 miles from the road, JBL is a gateway to the High Peaks. For 100 years, it has been an oasis for novice hikers making their first ventures into the mountains and for experienced hikers looking for a basecamp where they can also rest and recharge.

JBL is a junction where friends, families, and generations of travelers connect through outdoor recreation, community meals, and volunteer projects. It's a testament to conservation and stewardship, helping reduce the environmental impact of backcountry hiking and inspiring visitors to become land stewards themselves.

Throughout the year, we'll be sharing stories and experiences from JBL volunteers, visitors, and staff past and present, as we explore the many different ways in which the lodge has connected people, both to the land and to each other.

IMMEDIATE OPENINGS FOR VOLUNTEERS

At the annual October meeting, chapter officers are elected to serve the chapter for the following fiscal year. Please keep in mind that there are no prerequisites required for any of the positions, only the willingness to serve as a leader of the chapter. We have a vacancy for the following position:

Trustee: A Trustee serves both the Club and the Chapter. A Trustee shall represent the Chapter on the Club Advisory Council (AC), serve as an elected member of the Chapter Executive Committee (EC) and perform all other duties assigned under the Club Bylaws and Chapter Constitution and Bylaws. Become familiar with the Club Advisory Council Charter. Become familiar with the Chapter Constitution and Bylaws. Attend monthly Chapter EC meetings and Advisory Council meetings (at least four (4) times per year). Both of these meetings are currently being conducted either in person or virtually. Advise Chapter Chair and EC on all Club matters that may affect the Chapter. Report on AC meetings to the EC. Submit Chapter input on Club issues. File written reports on AC and club activities for the Chapter newsletter. If a Trustee cannot attend an AC meeting, the Chapter Chair shall be notified well in advance of the meeting. It is the responsibility of the Trustee to make the pre-meeting package available to the Alternate Trustee who will be expected to attend in place of the Trustee. The trustees are elected to serve for a one-year term and shall not serve for more than three successive annual terms. Trustees should endeavor to serve on one or more Club committees. The Trustee is a voting member of the Chapter Executive Committee.

Nominations are due by August 1, 2025. Nominations and officer biographies will be published in the September – November newsletter.



Now in our fourth year, your Glens Falls-Saratoga ADK Chapter's Buck Mountain-Pilot Knob Trailhead Steward Program is looking for volunteers for the Fall 2025 season - September and October.

Q: What's a Buck Mountain-Pilot Knob trailhead steward?

A: We can be found at the Buck Mountain-Pilot Knob trailhead parking lot on May to October weekends engaging hikers in safety (10 hiking essentials for every backpack-every hike) and stewardship (Leave No Trace Principles) conversation.

Q: I've never done this before. Is there training?

A: Yes! There is virtual training led by ADK staff. New trailhead stewards will be partnered with experienced stewards.

Q: My time is limited. What's the schedule?

A: Scheduling is very steward-friendly. Any amount of time you can give us we greatly appreciate it. We are targeting weekends from 8:30 to 12:30. Stewards can select any and all shifts that fit their schedules, even if it's just one or two shifts. Anything you can give us is terrific.

Q: Okay, I'm interested. How can I get more information or to sign up?

Research informs us that hiker education at trailheads and summits is the most impactful tool we have to protect backcountry resources and to grow a stewardship mindset among public land recreators. We hope you will consider joining us on this vital mission.



ADK Advocacy

The ADK has a robust advocacy effort at the club level. The Club actively supports the state budget process and legislation as it relates to the club's mission. You can check out current club activity by going to the main club level website: adk.org. For a list of NYS bills that are currently under consideration, go to:

Several bills have recently been receiving significant interest:

S7164 Which relates to ATV use under certain circumstances for persons with mobility issues. The club opposes this bill.

S6976 Which establishes a road salt reduction council to support state goals. The club supports this bill.

S4403 Which addresses an issue that is holding up certain state land acquisitions because of a title insurance requirement. The club supports this bill.

Club members are encouraged to become informed about these and other legislation and contact their representatives.

INTRO TO BIKEPACKING/BIKE TOURING (OVERNIGHT) Bike

Sat, Jul 5, 2025, time TBD, Rating: B+ Andrew Meunier - 518-376-2470, andrew.m.meunier@gmail.com This will be an overnight trip in which participants will carry all they need for an overnight camp on their bikes. The length of the riding each day will be limited. The emphasis will be on "dialing in" a bike touring setup that can be used in the future. Specifics will depend on participants' experience and comfort level, but potential destinations include Moreau State Park campground, Dacy Clearing, or the Essex Chain. A well-maintained bike with wider tires will work best, but we will work with whatever you have. It's possible to borrow bags, racks, etc., so don't let not having that equipment dissuade you! Typical overnight gear you would use for backpacking works well. A helmet is required.
